Dear Speaker Johnson,

As Members representing millions of people who rely on Medicaid, we write with deep concern regarding the House Republican budget reconciliation bill, which seeks to enact massive tax cuts for billionaires at the expense of providing lifesaving health care for women and families across our country. In every Congressional District, constituents and health care providers rely on Medicaid coverage to pay for a wide range of care, including reproductive health care. This coverage not only provides preventive care and saves lives, it also allows people to make decisions about how they want to plan for their futures and manage their reproductive health. We discourage you from bringing this budget reconciliation bill to the House Floor and urge you to instead think of the millions of families and individuals who rely on Medicaid coverage for access to essential health care, including reproductive health care, and prevent any cuts or additional restrictions that could impact the Medicaid program.

Since its implementation, Medicaid has opened the door for millions of people and families to have access to reproductive health care. This includes access to family planning services like birth control and pregnancy care, sexually transmitted infection (STI) testing and treatment, treatment for diseases like breast and cervical cancer, and postpartum care. One in three people rely on Medicaid for health coverage and Medicaid is the largest payer for pregnancy-related care, covering four in ten births.<sup>12</sup> This coverage is especially important for helping to reduce health disparities among people of color who face systemic barriers to access and disproportionately rely on Medicaid for health care coverage. This includes American Indian and Alaska Native (AIAN) and Black women who are over 3 times more likely to die from pregnancy related causes than white women. Additionally, Asian American, Native Hawaiian, and Pacific Islander (AANHPI), Latina women, people with disabilities, and LGBTQ+ people also experience persistent disparities in maternal and reproductive health outcomes.<sup>3</sup>

We have heard from our communities, and we know Medicaid is a lifeline for so many people and families that otherwise would not be able to afford and receive essential healthcare. It should come as no surprise that Medicaid expansion has had a measurable impact on reducing maternal and infant mortality, particularly among Black and Hispanic women and babies.<sup>4</sup> Nearly every state has elected to provide 12 months of postpartum coverage to moms enrolled in Medicaid at the time of delivery–improving access to care for these families.<sup>5</sup>

This increased access is, in states that have adopted Medicaid expansion, supported by the enhanced federal matching rate.

Any cuts to Medicaid would present a major setback on the progress we have made in reducing maternal and infant mortality. This includes the proposed work reporting requirements, which are ineffective at addressing workforce shortages, causing people to lose coverage and are simply cuts by another name. Without this coverage, disparities in maternal health care will increase, adverse health outcomes will rise, preventable deaths will increase, and access to comprehensive care before, during, and after pregnancy will become cost prohibitive for many people and families. The depth of harm that would be caused by cuts to this vital health program is staggering and would include low-income families, legal residents, people of color, those living with disabilities, safety-net hospitals, and community health centers, among others.

The economic harm of cutting Medicaid is also profound. Medicaid enables people to stay in the workforce, care for their families, and avoid medical debt. Research has shown that restrictions on reproductive health care limit educational and career opportunities and increase financial instability for low-income families.<sup>6</sup> These workers often lack access to employer-provided benefits and rely on Medicaid for their essential health care. Gutting Medicaid would force many people to make impossible decisions between affording care, housing, food, or transportation–and would deepen cycles of poverty across generations.

As it stands, the budget reconciliation bill cuts health care spending by at least \$715 billion and will leave 13.7 million people uninsured, mostly from cuts to the Medicaid program which provides health care coverage for more than 72 million people.<sup>7</sup> This includes imposing work reporting requirements that make Americans navigate arduous paperwork as frequently as monthly just to keep their health coverage, onerous eligibility checks, limitations on how states can fund their Medicaid programs, and "defunding" Planned Parenthood health centers, which provide essential health care services for more than 2 million patients per year. In fact, the CBO preliminary report found that "defunding" Planned Parenthood would actually increase the deficit by \$300 million.<sup>8</sup> Millions of people and health care providers rely on Medicaid; these cuts and attacks will have a far reaching impact on access to health care for all of our constituents.<sup>9</sup>

There is nothing wasteful about ensuring people have access to reproductive health care and improving maternal and infant health outcomes. The blueprint laid out in this budget reconciliation bill puts this essential health care coverage and our public health system at risk, giving billionaires a tax cut at the expense of women and families who need care the most. As it stands, the current framework would amount to the single largest cut to Medicaid in its 60 year history. We urge you to prevent any cuts or additional restrictions to the Medicaid program and prioritize the continued access to lifesaving health care for millions over the interests of billionaires.
